TALK ABOUT IT

- 1. Which parts of Gavin's story can you relate to?
- 2. Though it's not easy to admit, there are times when all of us expect reciprocation from our spouses.

What have you done, hoping to get something in exchange for your efforts? What did you hope to get? (Gavin joked about doing the dishes so he could get a "free pass" to play golf.)

How did you react when your spouse didn't reciprocate the way you had hoped? (Chantal's response was NOT what Gavin expected.)

- 3. In the message, Gavin said, "Jesus' love for us was never earned. It was never deserved."

 Does that match what you were first taught about God? How do you feel about God's love now?
- 4. John 13:34 says, "As I have loved you, so you must love one another." Despite his familiarity with the verse, Gavin realized he hadn't been loving like Jesus at all. In fact, Gavin's version of John 13:34 included some "rewrites":
 - Love one another when he/she deserves to be loved.
 - Love one another the way you want to be loved.
 - Love one another so that he/she will love you in return.
